A Brief History & Bright Future for Park Heights

Park Heights, a historic neighborhood in Northwest Baltimore that has been home to many vibrant communities over the decades, tells a story shared by many American cities—rich in culture, shaped by waves of migration, and marked by major social and economic changes. In the late 19th century, annexation and the expansion of the streetcar system turned Park Heights into a lively "streetcar suburb" with walkable streets and a strong local business scene. Landmarks like the Pimlico Racecourse, now home to the Preakness Stakes—originally opened in 1870 as the Pimlico Fairgrounds—helped drive economic growth and national attention, attracting hotels, restaurants, and entertainment venues. Today, the Park Heights community is experiencing a powerful resurgence through the initiatives implemented by Park Heights Renaissance.

COLLABORATION OVER COMPETITION

Established in 2007, as the first of eleven recommendations in the Park Heights Master Plan, Park Heights Renaissance (PHR) is a community development corporation that brings residents and community partners together around a shared vision for a stronger, more vibrant Park Heights. By coordinating efforts across six key areas - community leadership, education, community wellness & safety, real estate, workforce, and business development — PHR helps align resources, strategies, and leadership to achieve measurable outcomes. This model ensures that residents, businesses, organizations, and legislators are working collaboratively toward a thriving, equitable community where everyone has the opportunity to grow and succeed. Through this approach, PHR strengthens both the people and places that define Park Heights.

INDICATORS OF COMMUNITY WELLBEING

Despite its strengths, Park Heights faces significant challenges:

- Median household income: \$30,120 (\$20,000 below the citywide average)
- Unemployment rate: 18.1%
- Population: Seniors (65+) make up 25% of the population, while children under 18 account for 23%
- · Four of the census tracts within the Park Heights Master Plan footprint have child poverty rates exceeding 40%
